Fund (Fund). The state has provided the following information in response:

It typically takes six to nine months for an application to be received, reviewed, processed, and paid. The processing time varies depending upon the integrity of the application, the number of employees in the company, the number of applications received from other employers, the workload of the auditing staff, and the compliance status of the employer. The processing time may be shortened if the employer has a minimal number of employees or if the paperwork submitted is complete and does not require us to contact the employer for additional documentation. Conversely, the processing time will be delayed if the application is for a large company or if the application is incomplete and the employer must be contacted for the necessary documentation.

In terms of steps the state may take to improve the application review process, the state has noted it is taking measures to reduce the number of times it must contact the employer for additional documentation by updating the application instructions with detailed information on the required documents that must be submitted with the application. The state will also develop and post Frequently Asked Questions on the state website to address common problems and errors encountered and that may delay the employer's application process.

Throughout the approved waiver extension period, the Departments will continue to work with Hawaii to ensure that its section 1332 waiver complies with the statutory guardrails.
