## Key Message and Tips for Beneficiaries: Habilitation and Waiver Services

## Message

Habilitation services help you gain skills to become more successful and independent.[1]

If you get Medicaid through a waiver you may be able to receive habilitation services.[2] Habilitation services can help you learn, improve, and retain skills to help you live in the community. These include:

- Prevocational services;
- Educational services; and
- Supported employment services.[3]

If you need these services, talk with your doctor about including them in your service plan. These tips will help you follow Medicaid rules if you get habilitation services.



- Make sure habilitation services are ordered and approved by your doctor and written in your service plan;
- Get your services at home or at another approved location;
- Report any changes in your circumstances;
- Never sign any papers that are blank or have an error; and
- Get a copy of everything you sign.
