## FLOOD WATERS ARE RECEDING Tornado Costs Three Lives; Damage Great

No estimate of the loss can be given, but damage to highways, railroads and private individuals will run into hundreds

of thousands of dollars.

Telephone communication west of Culbertson was broken off early Thursday. Unconfirmed reports placed damage and loss of life high in Stratton, Benkelman, Parks, Max, Trenton and other villages in that section. The entire valley is a virtual lake.

The Willow was running high over the banks north of here, Curtis and vicinity received more than 3 inches of rain.

To the east, Willow creek went out by the school house, going over the highway

and cracking the bridge.

South of town fills on the bridges, on highway 183 were totally washed away. The river was running to a height of 27 feet over the old channel. The river was receding at 4 o'clock.

Debris, houses. buildings and hundreds of head of stock were swept down the river by the torrent. The Middleton, Nichols and Watkins homes were totally wrecked. The occupants were saved. The pastime dance hall was also swept away, and four houses cracked upon the bridge. Attempts to save them were futile.

Stranded on a bridge in the middle of the torrent are Pete Van Horn and I. S. Pate. The men have been on the main span of the bridge over 183 since early Friday morning. They were safe at 9:00.

Scattered reports here have been heard of the 12 people who were swept away in the house of Charles Miller, jr., located a mile south of Perry. It broke away at 3 o'clock. In the two parties were Dale Miller, Fred Swanson, Mrs. Charles Miller, jr. and six children, Nels Neilsen and Claude McKillip, Little hope is held out for them.

McCook is isolated. Road, rail and telegraph communication is down in all directions. Telephone communication can only reach as far as Indianola to the east. There is no other communication, altho attempts are being made to wireless a flash out to the radio stations.

The water tank at the light plant collapsed late Thursday hitting the building. The building crumbled in the center. John Herman, Paul Wilson, Bob French, and Mike Worske reached the bank safely. Between 34 and 37 men are still reported at the plant. Attempts are being made to get a line to them, a previous effort going down with the wires.
