Hurricane Safety Tips

BEFORE HURRICANE SEASON STARTS:

- •Create a family disaster plan & review all insurance policies.
- •Store valuables, papers, and photos in a dry and secure place.
- Trim tree branches close to home.
- ·If plywood shutters are needed for your home, purchase and cut to fit the plywood to the windows.
- •Stock up on canned or prepacked food, water, and other essential items.

BEFORE THE STORM:

- •Prepare your home for the storm. Secure outdoor material and put up or close window shutters if needed.
- •Fuel vehicles early and get extra cash.
- •Plan to evacuate if you live on the coastline, in a mobile home, or a flood plain.
- •Notify relatives of your evacuation plan and leave early.

AFTER THE STORM:

- •Respond to emergency officials. Be prepared to be away from your residence as long as a couple of weeks or more!
- •Once allowed to re-enter area, beware of any remaining debris or flooded areas.
- •Most post-hurricane related injuries or fatalities are caused by cleanup or carbon monoxide poisoning from generators.

Terminology

- •TROPICAL DEPRESSION is a tropical cyclone with maximum sustained surface wind speed (1-minute average) of 33 knots (38 mph) or less.
- •TROPICAL STORM is a tropical cyclone with maximum sustained surface wind speed (1-minute average) ranging from 34 knots (39 mph) to 63 knots (73 mph).
- •HURRICANE is a tropical cyclone with maximum sustained surface wind (1-minute average) of 64 knots (74 mph) or more.
- •MAJOR HURRICAME is a tropical cyclone with maximum sustained surface wind (1-minute average) of 96 knots (111 mph) or more.
- TROPICAL STORM/HURRICANE WATCH is issued when these conditions are POSSIBLE within 48 hours.
- TROPICAL STORM/HURRICANE WARNING is issued when these conditions are EXPECTED within 36 hours.
- •STORM SURGE is the abnormal rise in sea level before and during a tropical or posttropical cyclone approach and/or landfall.
- STORM SURGE WATCH is issued when these conditions are POSSIBLE within 48 hours.
- STORM SURGE WARNING is issued when these conditions are EXPECTED within 36 hours.
